






#### **Preview and warm-up**


In this lesson, we are going to learn about different ideals of beauty and practise expressing our opinions about them.



Beauty is health, pure and simple.

#### ideal

An **ideal** is what is **considered perfect** with respect to any given thing. An **ideal standard** is what everything else is measured against. Ideals are usually **difficult to achieve** for the normal person and that is why we refer to them as **ideals**.



One **ideal** of beauty was having unearthly pale skin, which represented wealth and purity.

#### beauty standard

A **beauty standard** is an **ideal of beauty** which a person is **measured against**. We refer to it as a standard because it suggests that people should **aim to reach it**.



The contemporary **beauty standard** for women is very much linked with a low body weight.



The **beauty standard** for men is changing, but strength and well-toned muscles are usually part of it.

#### platonic beauty

Platonic beauty comes from the philosophical ideas developed by the Greek philosopher Plato. Used as an adjective, platonic means that something is non-sexual. For this reason, platonic beauty refers to an ideal, non-sexual, form of beauty. More often you will hear people refer to platonic love, meaning non-sexual love.



The statues are so perfect; they represent a kind of **platonic** ideal of the body.

#### natural beauty

**Natural beauty**, on the other hand, is beauty that is **internal**. It is used to **refer** to people who are **beautiful without special clothes**, **make-up**, or **other cultural additions**, which are used to make something or someone appear more beautiful.



She's a real **natural beauty**; she doesn't need filters to make her look more attractive.

#### muse

#### nude

A muse is a source of inspiration for artistic activity. The artist draws their creativity and energy from the muse.

**Nude** as a noun refers to **someone** who is **wearing no clothes**. It can also be used as an adjective (nudist). Throughout Western art history, **muses posed nude** for the visual artist.



He married his **muse** and then shortly afterwards stopped painting.



He's sunbathing in the **nude** at the **nudist** beach.



laughter lines

His **laughter lines** show just how much he loves life and shares it with others.

expression wrinkles

She is 90 years old and has so many **expression wrinkles**; she has lived her life to the full.

nymph





#### **Ancient Greece**

**Ancient Greece** refers to a **period** in **Greek history** between the **13<sup>th</sup>** and **9<sup>th</sup> centuries BC**. Much of Western culture is still influenced by the philosophies and artworks developed during this period.



I did a course on **Ancient Greek** philosophy at university and found it surprisingly entertaining!

#### **Classical Age**

#### Renaissance

The **Renaissance** was an **influential period** in **Western culture**. The Renaissance was the period of time between the Middle Ages and the Modern period. Renaissance thinkers and artists were inspired by Classical antiquity (**the Classical Age**).



The **Renaissance** was a celebration of humanism through the rediscovery of classical antiquity.

#### breathtaking

#### extraordinary

**Breathtaking** is used to describe events or things that **take your breath away**. For this reason, it is most commonly used to **describe scenery**, such as mountains and valleys and artistic performances.

By contrast, we use **extraordinary** as a **synonym** for **great**. It can also be used to describe someone who is somehow **better than the rest**.



The view from the mountains took my breath away; it was **breathtaking**.




That was an **extraordinary** concert and the audience clapped for a long time.

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#### golden ratio

Taken from mathematics, the **golden ratio** is a ratio between the sides of a rectangle. This ratio occurs naturally in nature and is used a lot in design. The golden ratio is also found in **works of art** such as the **Mona Lisa** and in buildings such as the **Parthenon** and the **pyramids** of **Egypt**. Some studies show that the **golden ratio** is **naturally liked by the human gaze**.

#### Homework answer key

I think the standards of beauty for men and women are different. Men are encouraged to be muscular and assertive looking and women are encouraged to be some alim and well proportioned. However, I am not sure that these ideals are the same across all countries or cultures, and even in my own culture I think they are changing. The way I see it, beauty can be most found in most things because most of the time what we find beautiful reflects something about our values and everyone has different values. It is not always the case that those who are most glamorous are also the most beautiful because nowadays glamour is achieved through altering the body. I prefer natural beauty as an ideal, but I am also attracted by more platonic ideal images because they are, unlike a normal body, works of art.
