




#### Goals

## **Preview and warm-up**

- In this lesson, we will look at **second**, **third** and **mixed conditionals**.

**If I worked** from home, I **would be** more productive.



#### **Second conditional**

■ *If* + subject + past simple, + subject + *would* + bare infinitive.



If I had more free time, I would learn a new language.

If I were the CEO, I would hire more women.





#### **Second conditional**

- We use the second conditional to talk about:
  - **Possible** situations and their **probable** results;
  - Situations we do not expect to happen;
  - **Imagined situations** that are different from the real situation.

<i>If</i> clause	Main clause	Meaning
If I didn't go to work	, I would be fired.	This is an <b>imagined situation</b> and with a <b>probable result</b> .
If I won lots of mone	y, I would retire.	This is a <b>very unlikely</b> situation that <b>probably won't happen</b> .
If he knew her address, he would visit her.		This is an <b>imagined situation</b> . The <b>real situation</b> is that he doesn't know his address.

#### Using modal verbs in the second conditional

- You can use other **modal verbs** in the **second conditional**.
- Using verbs like *could* and *might* allows you to express *ability* and *possibility*.
- You can use these modals in the same way as **would.**



If I sold my car, I could take the bus to work instead.

If you studied harder, your grades might improve.

#### Third conditional

If + subject + past perfect, + subject + would + have + past participle.



If I had listened in the meeting, I would have known what to do.

If he had wanted a lift, he would have told me.





#### **Third conditional**

- The **third conditional** describes **an imagined past event.**
- We often use the it when we **regret** something that didn't happen.
- We wish the action or the event in the main clause had happened.

<i>lf</i> clause	Main clause	Meaning
If I had seen you, I would have said hello.		But I <b>didn't see</b> you, so I <b>couldn't</b> say hello (but I wish I had done)
If I hadn't been tired, I would have gone to the party.		But I was too tired, so I <b>didn't go</b> (but I wish I had gone)
<b>If he had taken the job</b> , he would have been very happy.		But he <b>didn't take</b> the job, so it <b>isn't possible</b> for him to feel happy.

#### Continuous tenses and the third conditional

- If + subject + past perfect, + would + have + been + -ing form.
- We use **continuous tenses** to refer to the **unfulfilled result** of the action in the **if**-clause. It expresses this result as an **unfinished or continuous action**.



If he hadn't accepted the job in London, he would have been working in Amsterdam now.

If she had passed her exams, she would have been studying her Master's this year.





## Using continuous tenses and the third conditional

#### Mixed conditionals - third + second

If + subject + past perfect, + subject + would + bare infinitive.



If you hadn't made such a mess in the office, the cleaners would be finished by now.

If I had left work earlier, I would not be stuck in this traffic.





# Mixed conditionals - third + second

- The **third** + **second mixed conditional** communicates:
  - A present result of a past condition.

<pre>If + past perfect (third conditional)</pre>	would + present infinitive (second conditional)	Meaning
If I had been born in Paris, I would be a Parisian.		I <b>wasn't</b> born in Paris, so I am <b>not</b> a Parisian (but I <b>would be</b> if I was born in Paris)
If you had taken my advice, you would be happy.		You <b>didn't</b> take my advice, but you <b>would be</b> happy if you did
If she had already arrive	ed, I would be able to see her.	I know she <b>hasn't</b> arrived yet. When she arrives, I will be <b>able to see her</b> .



### Mixed conditionals - second + third

■ lf + subject + past simple, + subject + would + have + past participle.



If you were less noisy, the baby would not have woken up.

If we had more time, you definitely would have confessed!





# Mixed conditionals - second + third

- The second + third mixed conditional communicates:
  - A past result of a present or continuing condition.

<pre>If + past simple (second conditional)</pre>	would + have + past participle (third conditional)	Meaning
<b>If you were a real friend</b> , yo	u would have helped me.	But you <b>didn't help</b> me because <b>you</b> <b>aren't</b> a real friend
If you were good at your job, we wouldn't have fired you.		But you are <b>bad</b> at your job, so we <b>did</b> fire you
If he wasn't such a good sui	<b>rfer</b> , he would have hated Australia.	But he is a <b>good</b> surfer, so he <b>enjoys</b> Australia




