

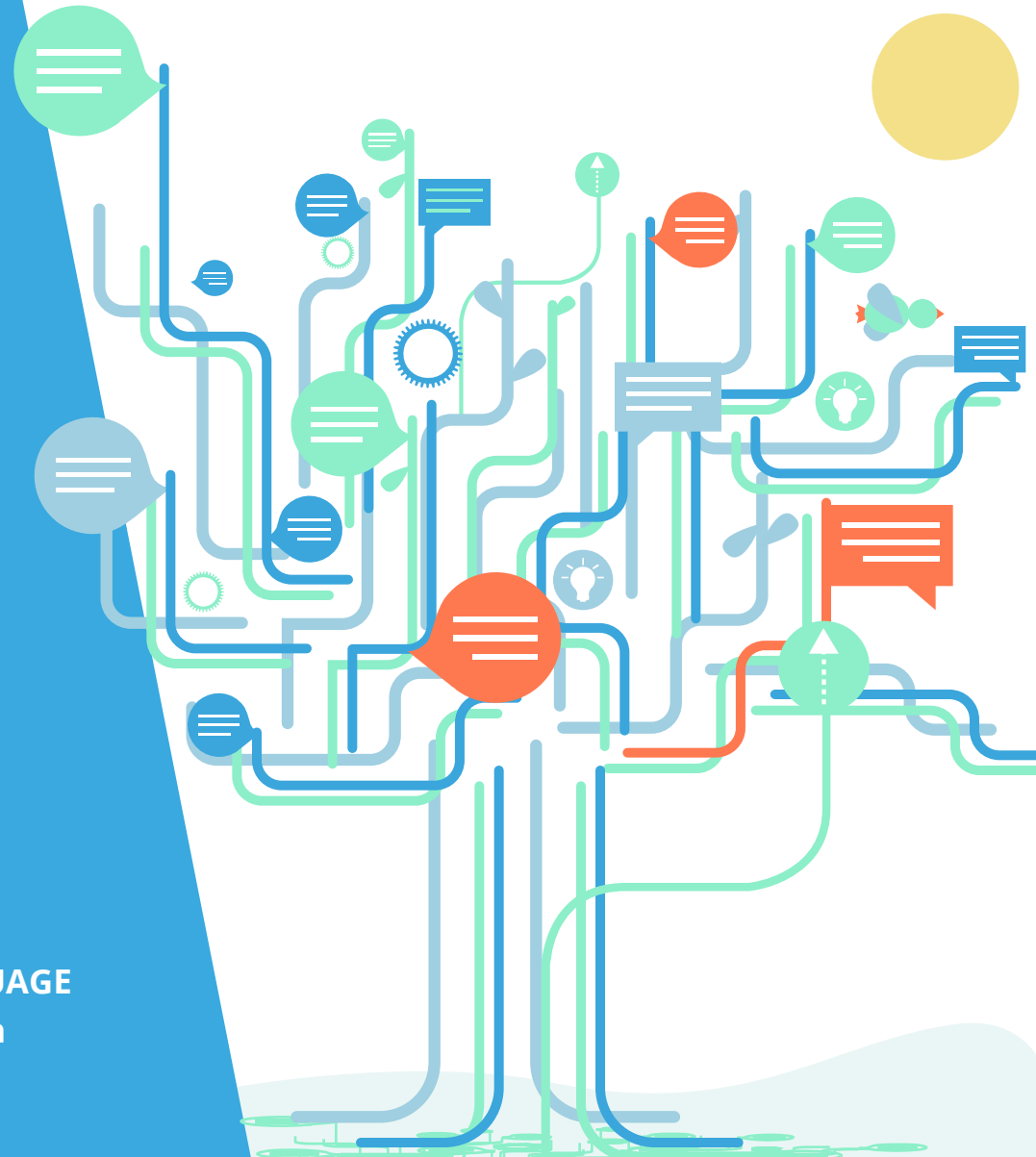

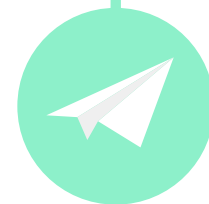


Goals

- Can distinguish between the use of 'in', 'on' and 'at' for times.
- Can use some basic adverbs of time in simple sentences.



We have dinner reservations **on** Saturday **at** seven o'clock. We went to the same restaurant **last** week and it was really good. I'm glad we're going again **in** three days. We're going to the theatre **after** dinner.





In, at, and on

- We use a particular preposition of time for different types of time.
 - **in** – we use **in** with months of the year, parts of the day, and seasons
 - **on** – we use **on** with days of the week and calendar dates
 - **at** – we use **at** with times on the clock

in	on	at
in January	on Monday	at two o'clock
in the morning	on January 10 th	at half past three
in the spring	on the first day of the month	at noon



More about *in*

- We also use **in** to say that some time will pass.
- We can use **in** with any amount of time in this way: seconds, minutes, hours, days, weeks, months, years, decades, etc.

in a few seconds	when a few seconds have passed
in thirty minutes	when thirty minutes have passed
in four hours	when four hours have passed
in two weeks	when two weeks have passed
in six months	when six months have passed
in five years	when five years have passed

Other prepositions of time

We can also use prepositions of time to say how different events or times relate to each other.

preposition	example
before	Breakfast is before lunch.
during	I watched TV during lunch.
between	Lunch is between breakfast and dinner.
after	Dinner is after lunch.
from ... until	I eat breakfast from seven o'clock until half past seven.



Earlier and later

- We can use **last** and **next** to say that it was earlier or later.
- We can use **last** and **next** with weeks, months, seasons, years, and days.

earlier	now	later
yesterday	today	tomorrow
last week	this week	next week
last month	this month	next month
last spring	this spring	next spring
last year	this year	next year
