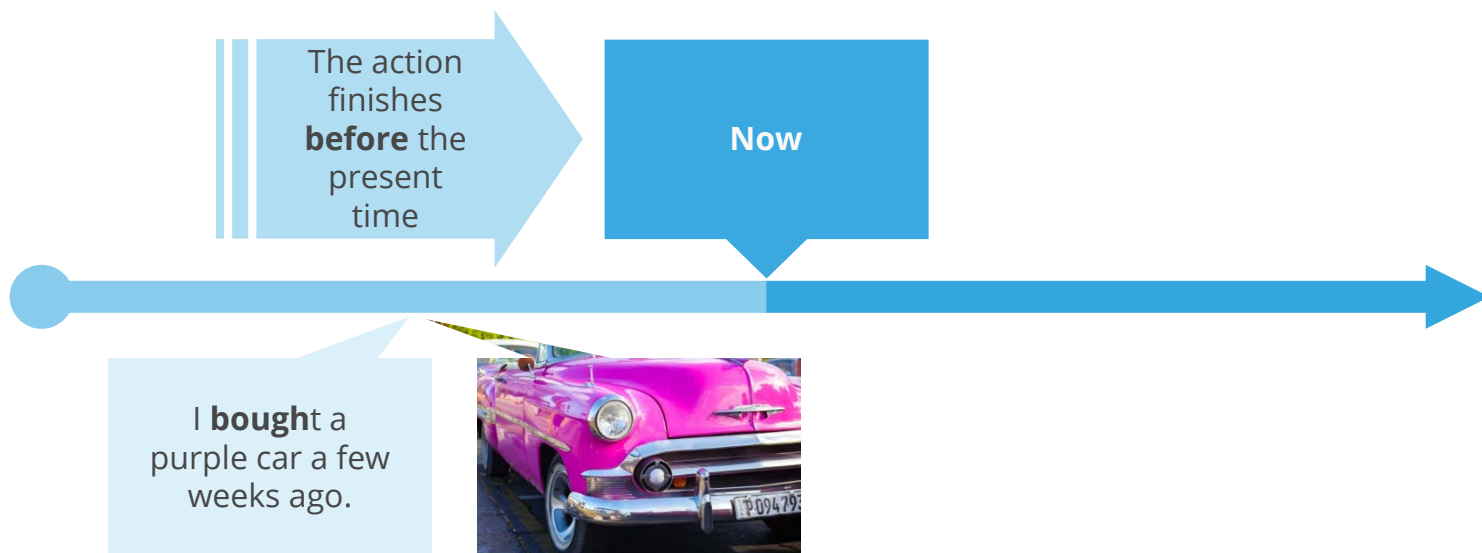


I **was** on time for work **yesterday**.

Past simple – a finished action with no result in the present

- We use the past simple:
 - For **completed events, states or actions.**
 - For events that **happened** and **finished** in the **past.**





Present perfect 1 – *Roxanne has been to Spain*

- We use the present perfect to talk about a time from the **past** till **now**.
- This is often an **experience** in someone's life.





Present perfect 1 – *Roxanne has been to Spain*

- We often use **never** with negative sentences in the present perfect.
- We use **ever** for **questions** – *Have you ever been to Spain?*
- We use words like **once** and **twice** to say **how many times** we have done something – *I have been to Spain twice.*

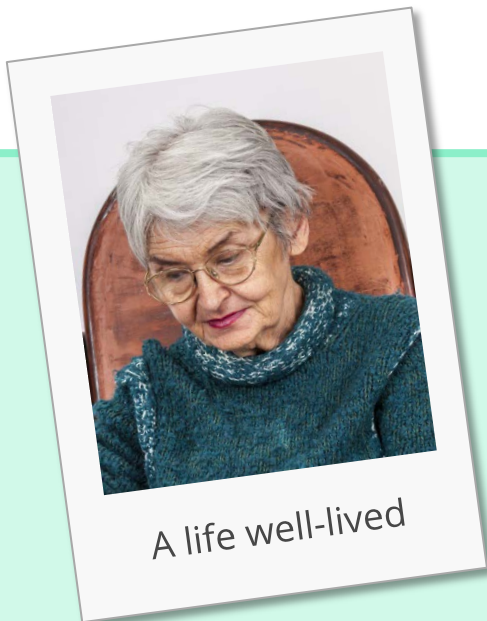

Present perfect 2 – *I have known David for two years*

- We also use the present perfect for **unfinished actions** that **started in the past** and **continue to the present**.
- **For** tells us **how long** an action goes on – *for two years, for an hour, for a week*.
- **Since** tells us when an action **started** – *since last week, since 1994, since he was a child*.

Present perfect 3 – *She has cleaned the kitchen*

- We also use the present perfect for **finished actions** that have a **result in the present**.
- *I've lost my phone.* → The result is that I can't use my phone to call my friend.

Present simple (Morning) →	Present continuous (Afternoon) →	Present perfect (Evening)
They are at work.	They are leaving work.	They have left work.
Sophie needs a new phone.	Sophie is shopping.	Sophie has bought a new phone.
The weather forecast is bad .	It is raining.	It hasn't stopped raining.



Present perfect 3 – *She has cleaned the kitchen*

- Look at the sentences and pictures below.
- In this example below, the result is that the woman can now relax because she **has finished** cleaning the kitchen.

The kitchen is dirty. →



She is cleaning the kitchen. →



She **has cleaned** the kitchen.

Present perfect 3 – *She has cleaned the kitchen*

1. Diego needs a key to get into his office building.



Diego is leaving his flat without his key.



(forget)

They are getting ready for bed.



(go)

Present perfect 4 – *just* and *already*

- We use the **present perfect** for **recent actions** in the **past** that **still affect** the **present**.
- To express this, we use the word ***just***. ***Just*** = a **short** time ago.
- We use ***already*** when something in the past happened **before** it was **expected**.

Dialogue 1

A: Are Clara and Sonya here for the meeting?

B: Yes, they have just arrived.

Dialogue 2

A: Priya, this is Heather.

B: Actually, we've already met. We went to a conference together last year.





Present perfect 4 – *yet*

- **Yet** means **until now**.
- We use **yet** in **negative** present perfect sentences.
 - **Yet** goes at the end of these sentences.
- We also often use **yet** in **questions**.

Dialogue 1

A: Is Martin here?

B: No he hasn't arrived yet.

Dialogue 2

A: Has Martin arrived yet?

B: No, he hasn't.

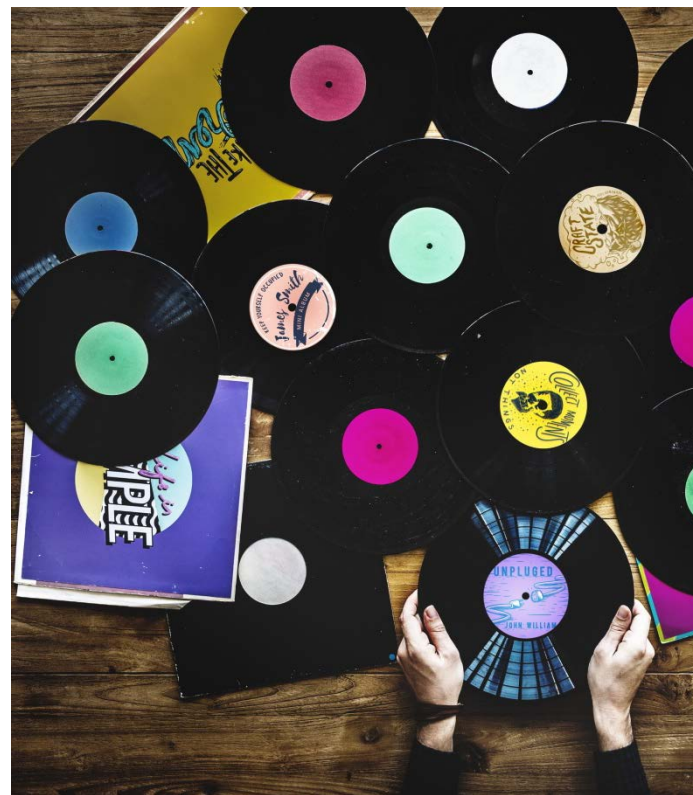


Past simple vs. present perfect



- We use **past simple** + **finished time** – *yesterday, last week, this morning.*

Past simple	Present perfect
I lost my folder last week . (= finished action)	I have lost my folder. (= I can't find it now)
Paul left for work after breakfast . (= finished action)	Paul has left for work. (= He isn't here now)
Did you buy their new album when you went shopping yesterday ? (= finished actions)	Have you heard their new album? (= between the album coming out up to now)

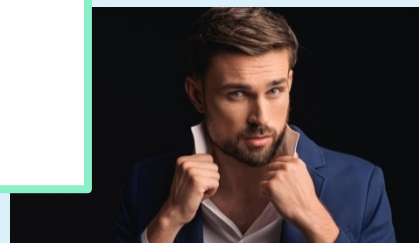




Past simple vs. present perfect

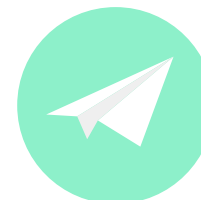

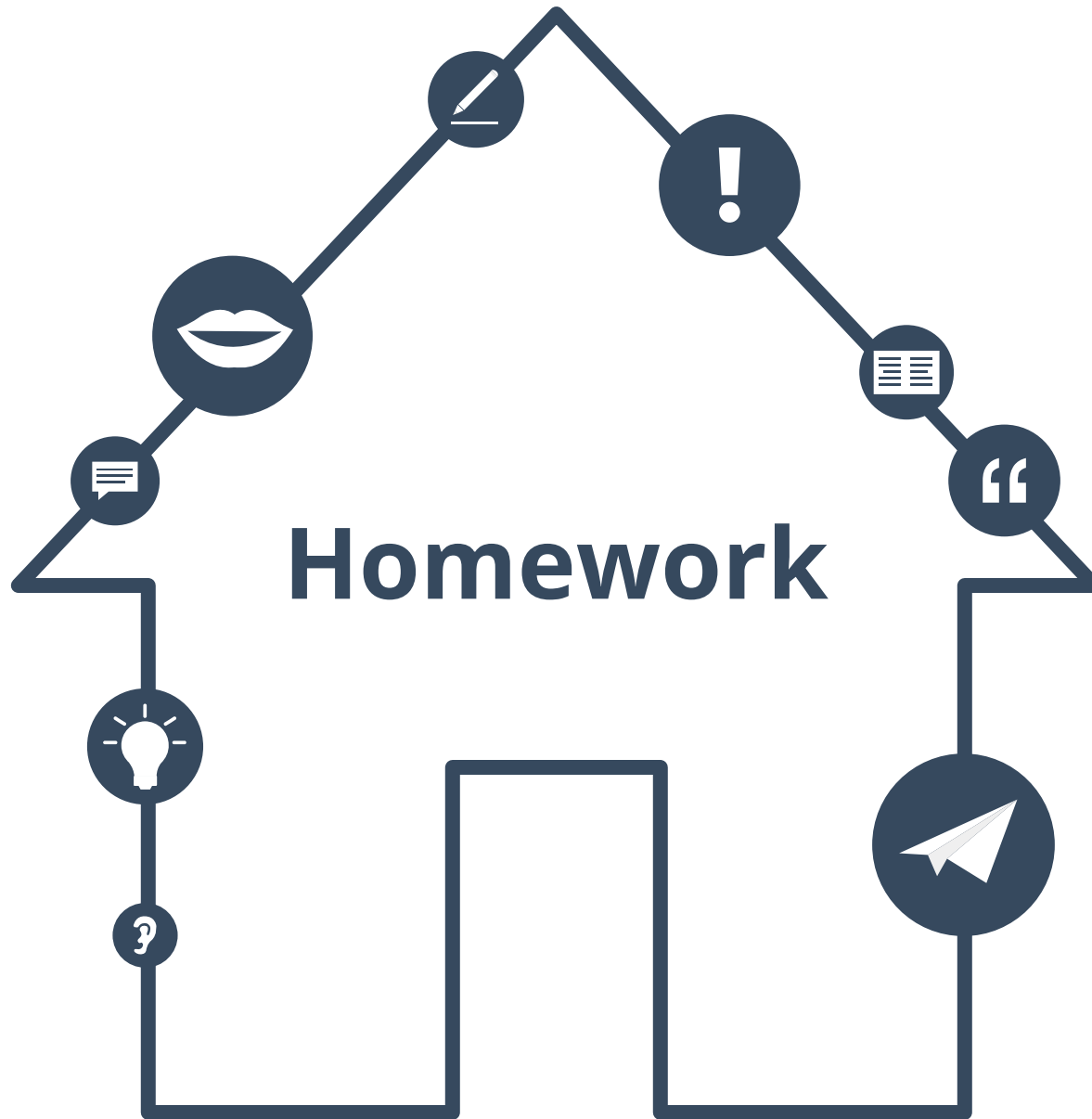
