

regulations

Rules are sets of explicit regulations or principles to control the procedure within a particular area of activity.

Regulations are **rules** or **directives** made and **maintained** by an **authority**.



If you do not follow the **rules** of the game, you won't be able to play for long.



Because of recent **regulations**, people flying on international flights need to carry two forms of identification.

handling

packing

Handling something means **feeling**, **holding** or **manipulating** with the **hands**.

Packing is an action or process of putting items in a container



This rare painting requires the most careful **handling** as it is over a thousand years old.



We had to finish all of our **packing** for the trip but the suitcase was too small.

shipped

transported

When something was **shipped**, this used to mean goods or people transported by **sea**. Nowadays, shipped is also used to describe the movement of goods by any transport. We often use shipped to talk about goods ordered **online**.

When something is **transported**, goods or people are **taken** or **carried** from one place to another by means of a **vehicle**, **aircraft**, or ship.



Although I didn't pay extra for overnight shipping, the product was **shipped** very quickly and I received it the next day.



The prisoner was **transported** to a different prison, located closer to his family.



A couple recently returned from a fancy dinner at a famous seafood restaurant. They usually cook at home because Jane is a very **picky** eater, but it was their 5th wedding anniversary so they decided to have something **out of the ordinary**. On their way home, both of them were not feeling quite right. They suddenly felt very ill and Jim had to **call in sick** at work the next day. Since Jane is a nurse, she had to take the morning off work. What was it that made the couple so sick in such a short amount of time? Was it the food at the restaurant? Was it some **airborne** illness? Or perhaps it was something from the hospital where Jane worked?

One way that we can **track** a product from its **origin** or **source** to a retail location is **product traceability**. Product traceability allows us to identify and track a product or a **component** from its **point of origin** to a location where it is consumed or purchased by customers. It plays an important role in helping to **protect** the public because it allows health agencies to identify more quickly and **accurately** potential sources of **contaminated** goods. It can also verify that produce is locally grown and improve operating productivity for those growing or **shipping** the items.

So, was it the seafood, or something else that caused Jim and Jane to become ill? Two common ways to find out are by tracing the product via radio-frequency **identification** or **barcodes** where various data or codes can be **applied** to the packaging or label. This allows us to determine the source, location, movement and storage conditions as well as where it was **shipped** and the rest of the **supply chain** that it went through to reach the consumer's mouth. Jim and Jane contacted the restaurant to find out more.







It was right in their home and luckily, they were able to **rule out** the restaurant as well as Jane's workplace as the culprit. The pipes were fixed that same day and Jim and Jane already began to feel better. They returned to work shortly after and also went back to the same seafood restaurant with the confidence and trust in the **produce** used in their food.
