

Organise your biography

- A **biography** is usually written in **chronological order**.
- This doesn't mean that you need to mention every small detail of the person's life.
- You should pick out the important or interesting parts.

Birth and childhood	When and where they were born, where they grew up and which adults were important to them, their schooling and behaviour.
Adulthood	Private life: marriage, children, relationships and friendships Career: the highlights of their working life
Old age and death	What they did in their later years, and how and when they died.



Writing a biography

When you know the structure, you can move on to **researching** your subject and **finding out** about their life.

- There are usually lots of **sources**, primary and secondary, that you can use to find out about a famous subject.
- You can also do **interviews** with people to find out more about them.
- When you have all of your information, you're ready to **write**!





Charles Dickens biography

Charles Dickens was an English writer who was born in Portsmouth in 1812. Up until he was 12, Dickens had a very nice childhood, spending his time going to school, reading, and playing outside. When he was 12, his family moved to London and Dickens was **forced** to leave school and work 10 hour days to help pay his family's debts. His experience working in a factory became the basis for a lot of his novels which **criticised** how the working class were **treated** in England in the nineteenth century, and particularly of his novel David Copperfield, which was semiautobiographical.





Charles Dickens biography

He left school **permanently** when he was 15 and later became a political journalist. He **published** a series of short stories, *The Pickwick Papers*, while he was a journalist. The late-1830s were a busy time for Dickens as he got married, had three of his ten children, and published *Oliver Twist*, still one of his most famous works. Dickens was a very popular novelist in his own time, and he published at least 28 novels in his lifetime, including A Christmas Carol and Great *Expectations*. He was a critic of **poverty** all his life, and this showed in his novels. Dickens died in 1870 after having a **stroke**. He was working on a **mystery** novel at the time, part of which had been published.

Compare your writing

Read through the biography of a famous sportsperson below and compare your writing.

Maharaja Ranjitsinhji was born in India in 1872. He was a cricketer for England and a Prince of a state in India. He was initially named as the **heir** to the throne, but then was **demoted** and sent to a British school in India. He joined Cambridge University in 1889 and became one of the best members of the university cricket **team**, even though he had never played an organised game of cricket before. There was some opposition to Ranjitsinhji playing for both Cambridge and England because of his nationality, but he became a member of the England cricket team in 1896. He was one of the best batsmen of all time and he had extremely quick reaction speeds. In 1906 he returned to India where he became Maharaja of a state, though he continued to play cricket at times. He was a popular **leader** in India, despite stories in the press about his financial problems; however, many sources report that he never seemed happy in India and split his time between there and England later in his life. He **died** in India in 1933.






