

One way for European students to **dive into** this new experience is through the Erasmus programme. The Erasmus programme stands for the *European Community Action Scheme for the Mobility of University Students*. It is a student exchange programme which operates within 36 different European countries and it started in 1987. Students who are accepted into this programme will study at least three months in another European country or take an internship. They will not have to pay any extra **tuition** fees and they could even be **eligible** for an Erasmus **grant**, which can help cover additional **miscellaneous** expenses.





Living abroad as a student or worker is much different from being there as a tourist. Meeting local people can be a real eye-opening experience. You can discover new foods, attractions and develop new friendships. Of course you might **struggle** at first, but this valuable experience **translates** well into real life after graduation. You might miss your family and friends, but knowing that it is just temporary and that you will return to your home country soon can be comforting if you are someone who finds the experience **somewhat** stressful.

















The Erasmus programme is about the student mobility and internationalisation of higher education. Having the chance to study, work or live abroad provides the opportunity of a lifetime for many and will carry on for the rest of their lives. Many academics predict that, as a result of the programme, many of our future leaders and educators will have a completely different perspective on globalisation and political influences, leading us towards a more intimate and shared view of the world.

Inga the exchange student in Australia

Inga is an **enthusiastic** English teacher who works at an English-German bilingual school in Berlin, Germany. Seeing lots of job opportunities at a young age, she decided to continue her education after school and **specialised** in business engineering. She was having a **blast** learning new things that she was completely **captivated** by and she was **acing** every class she took. The professor suggested that Inga should apply for an exchange student programme in order for her to gain valuable experience abroad. Inga **hesitated** to accept the offer thinking that it was going to cost too much. However, the professor told Inga that if she gets accepted, she won't have to pay for tuition or accommodation. She left the office with the biggest smile on her face and started preparing for all the documents she needed for the application process.
