

Music has always been a way for people to express themselves. Certain types of music are **associated with** the people who listen to them, from goths and hippies, to punk and heavy metal.

One of the best known **subcultures** related to music are the hippies, who are forever connected with folk and jazz style music, and later rock and **psychedelic** tunes. Hippies first formed a subculture on the west coast of the USA, particularly around San Francisco, but their numbers quickly grew. They were easily **identified** by their long hair and colourful style of dress, which were seen as a **reaction** against the **conformist** elements in society. Hippies were heavily involved in the Vietnam War protests in the United States in the late 1960s. Many hippies also travelled a lot, and there was even a route from Europe to India which was nicknamed the hippie trail as so many people undertook the route by train and bus to reach either Goa in India or Kathmandu in Nepal.

Arriving in the mid-1970s were the punks. With their black clothes and **teased** hairstyles, they could not have looked more different to the laidback hippies. Punks were and are associated with punk rock, an **aggressive** version of rock music. They wore leather and tartan, skinny jeans and clothes held together by **safety pins** and tape. They **rejected** mainstream and **conventional** views, while staying authentic was highly valued. In Peru, punk subculture really came into its own in the mid-1980s, as punks there circulated illegal cassette recordings of music, which in fact continues to this day as free digital copies are circulated in the country as an expression of the punks being anti-establishment.







Moving on to goths, a subculture which began in England in the 1980s. Gothic rock was a **successor** to punk music and featured dark and **introspective** lyrics. Goths themselves made a **startling** fashion statement in the '80s. Influenced by 19th century gothic romance novels, goths often had very pale faces, black hair and black clothes. The goth subculture is somewhat unusual because members often remain goths after their teenage years and well into their adult lives. Furthermore, they are also often well-educated and have high-paying jobs, a contrast to the anti-establishment punks and hippies.

Moving to Africa, we have Botswana's Renegades or the Botswana metalheads, leather-wearing cowboys who love American and home-grown metal music. There is a competition in this 1500-strong subculture as to who can look the best or the most flamboyantly frightening, and they mix their traditional hunting knives and animal hides along with metal band t shirts and of course a leather jacket, a rather warm accoutrement in the Kalahari desert. Many of them also love to ride large motorbikes.

















For our last subculture, we are going to look at Japan and a subculture which was adopted from the West. Rockabilly was a thriving subculture in Japan, where the musical mash-up of rock and roll and country remained popular long after it fell out of favour in its birthplace of the USA. Leather jackets and ducktail hair were the uniform of the rockabilly, and very enthusiastic dance moves were one of their calling cards.




Finally, not a subculture but a person **universally despised** by all of those real members of musical subcultures is the **poser**. A poser is a person who tries to fit in with a certain group or lifestyle that they don't really believe in. We can start by looking at the teenagers **derided** by goths as they dress in black but **barely** listen to any gothic music, and buy their clothes in a normal shopping centre (the very thought!). The **poser** is most **associated** with the punk subculture, in which it is commonly recognised that though many people dress like punks they do not really care for the music, nor do they **embody** the values of punk.






