




Goals

Genealogy

Do you know much about your family history? Have you ever tried to trace your family tree? If you've ever been curious to find out more about past generations of your family then perhaps genealogy is a hobby you might like to pick up. Genealogy is the study of family roots, lineage and history. You might be surprised to learn that in actual fact it's currently the second most popular hobby in the US after gardening. Genealogy isn't a recent trend; throughout the ages people have always been fascinated by their origins and wanted to know more about their ancestors. However, until more recent times genealogy was largely a pursuit confined to the wealthy upper classes and aristocracy. Such individuals were especially keen to prove their family history in order to legitimise their claims to wealth and power. In recent years the appeal of genealogy has widened, and the subject has become of interest to ordinary, everyday families. Its popularity has probably been bolstered by a spate of successful TV shows and books about the hobby which have attracted large mainstream audiences and fuelled people's desire to do some family digging and sleuthing of their own.

Genealogy

With the growth and development of the internet, there has perhaps never been a better time to become an amateur genealogist. Gone are the days of having to spend long hours combing through dusty records in the corner of a dark library room in order to find out where your forgotten great great grandfather lived. Nowadays, many public records such as birth, death and marriage certificates, as well as newspaper and old magazine articles can be found online. However, despite the advantages offered by modern technology, tracing back your family tree still isn't an easy task; any information you find has to be carefully checked and verified to be sure of your results. So perhaps the real question is, why are people still so endlessly fascinated with this pursuit?



Genealogy

For some people there are particular practical reasons for wanting to know more about their lineage. For example, we now know that certain medical conditions can be genetic, so knowing your family medical history can be helpful as you can find out which illnesses and conditions you might be susceptible to in order to take early preventative action. Also on a more practical level, genealogy is still sometimes needed to trace distant heirs and correctly distribute inheritance.

Genealogy

Discovering the hardships and difficulties that our ancestors had to struggle with can be very motivating and inspiring, or realising that our past was greatly influenced by certain historical events can make things that seemed like just a story suddenly take on much more significance in our lives. Genealogy is also, in some ways, a comforting sort of hobby. Through tracing our family history we see connections to other people in the past and the present, and to the world around us, and this can help us to feel more at ease with our place on earth, and in the here and now, and to have more hope for the future.

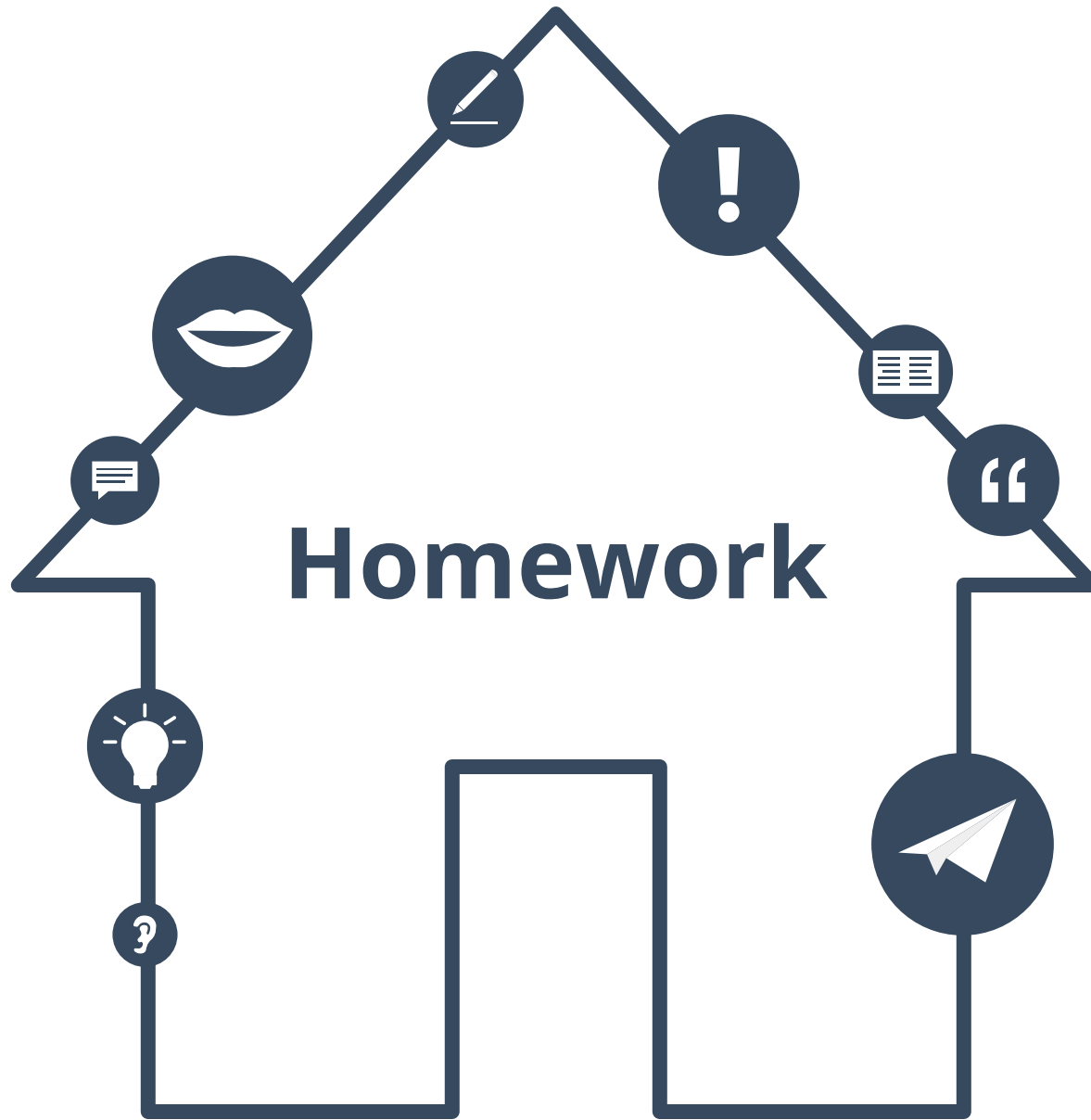
